

he Speedster Program has been moving right along this year and has several projects in the works. They include a 1929 Model A Roadster, a 1928 Chevrolet Pie Wagon and a 1926 Model T Ford Pickup. These projects are in various stages of completion and will carry over into next year when we should see some of them come to completion.

Students are being taught welding by mentor John Larson, upholstery by mentor Arlen Buck and carpentry by various other mentors. These mentors are a valued addition to the program as they continue to teach students what it takes to build a vehicle from the bottom to top.

The school has been able to sell some projects this year: a trailer that was built by students and mentor Jack Adams, and

### 1927 Indian Ace 4 on Loan to the Museum

ur museum has recently had the good fortune to receive a rare and spectacular motorcycle on long-term loan from the Brower Family. Gary Brower contacted me at the end of 2017 regarding his family's desire to display their 1927 Indian Ace 4 cylinder motorcycle that his grandfather, Nicholas V. Brower, restored and is now part of the Patricia and Chip Brower collection.

The Henderson Brothers produced a 4-cylinder motorcycle under the Henderson Motorcycle Company until 1917 when the company was sold to Ignaz Schwinn's Excelsior Motor Manufacturing &

Supply Co. William Henderson left in 1919 to form the Ace Motorcycle Co. but was killed while test riding one of his prototypes in 1922. The Indian Motorcycle Co. bought Ace in 1927 and produced their first 4-cylinder motorcycle under the Indian-Ace brand. In 1928, Indian dropped the Ace name, using just the Indian name from then on for the four. Thus 1927 was the only year for the Indian Ace 4.

This motorcycle was expertly restored by Nicholas Brower in the early to mid- 1980's. The engine and transmission were rebuilt by Ken Young Sr., a nationally known expert on 4-cylinder motorcycle engines. Nicholas did everything else, traveling the world in search of parts and advice.

### Prized Alfa Debuts at Local Show

he culmination of a career of 55 years collecting classic cars has just reached its apex for Doug Nelson, longtime auto aficionado and Museum founder. Doug recently unveiled his 1933 Alfa Romeo 8C Monza at the recent Salem Roadster Show. The restoration project, done with the invaluable

help of member and friend Chip Hellie, took more than five years. It included finding parts in 3 continents and traveling to Italy to view and document other examples.

The car was found in a barn in Ohio and required a considerable hunt for parts. However, the body paint was buffed and retains its old patina. Only about 15 of these Monzas were produced specifically for racing and

most went to race for the Alfa Romeo Race Team at that time under the management of Enzo Ferrari. This was way before the first Ferrari was produced in 1947.

The Alfa Romeo 8c was the Super Car of its day. The engine was designed by Vittorio Jano and is a

masterpiece of engineering with twin overhead camshafts, and gear-driven supercharger. It was capable of 130 mph at a time when most cars ran no more than 30. The 8c dominated racing competition in the 30s and won many Grand Prix Championships.

This piece of automotive history will certainly be a wonderful sight around the Museum and at some local shows this summer. Well done, Doug!

### 1949 Fleetline Donated to Museum

regory Ball of Irvine, California, recently donated a family heirloom that has been in the family for nearly 70 years. Greg inherited the car as a young man from his grandfather, who passed away in 1967, and drove it daily until 1971. It was then stored in a garage until 2018 when donated to our

The car, a 1949 Chevrolet Fleetline, is in remarkable original condition with its original engine and interior. The seats even have the protective seat covers installed when new protecting the original factory seats. The body and paint are straight and very presentable.

1949 was a landmark year in Chevrolet production because it was the first all-new design after World War II and sales were very strong. The Fleetline model was very handsome with its fastback styling and lower profile. Many of these cars became hotrodder favorites in the 60s, so few exist in stock form like this gem.



What makes this car so special is also it's history and documentation. It was purchased new by Greg's maternal grandfather (Manfred Mohr) on December 16th, 1949 from Ball Brothers Chevrolet in Turner, Oregon. The sales documents on the transaction were signed by Elton Ball, Greg's father, who was one of the partners of the dealership. This rich local history and documentation makes this a fine piece of local automotive history.

Its new home at the Museum is less than 20 miles away from where the car was sold and enjoyed almost 70 years ago.

We extend our deep thanks to Greg and Carol Ball for their donation of the car along with a check for \$5000 to go toward the preservation of this fine automobile.

by Kilgore. It's
remarkable in the
fact that it's virtually
as new.

At first glance one would expect a reproduction. Second glance,



perhaps a very high quality restoration. On careful inspection it becomes evident it's all original. Paint, nickel plating, everything! That's remarkable when you consider it's around 90 years old!

The Kilgore Manufacturing Co. was formed in 1925 from the consolidation of 3 toy companies. They were first located in Westerville, Ohio, and later moved to Tennessee where they closed up in 1985.

There are rumors that some were also produced in Ontario and Quebec, Canada.

They are not considered all that rare but are somewhat harder to find in comparison with their other counterparts, such as Arcade and Hubley.

They made various cast iron toys such as cars, trucks, airplanes, baby buggies, and cast iron boats that had to have worked so well in the bathtub!

If you ever find one this nice you should own it!
