

3. Rebuild and Restore 3 Model A engines.






Each of the three grant projects, when completed, will generate income for the Speedster Program. Thank you to all involved!

This fire department ladder truck was made by the JOHILLCO CO. of England back in 1934. The name is short for John Hill but apparently nobody knows why or who he was. Similar in manufacture to the slush cast toys made here in the US in the 20's, I find it very similar in construction to the 30's Tootsie Toy and also the English Dinky toys by Meccano

They were best known for their hollow cast lead toy soldiers. That was a real pain

for the Britains Toy Soldiers Co., as the John Hill versions were cheaper and sold individually not like Britains', which sold in sets.

They started producing lead cast toys in 1898 and went over to plastic in the 50's. They soon after went out of business in the early 60's. They are said to have had many different sculptures involved in creating various toys. Some were good, some were bad, and the rest were ugly.

This truck was done well and escaped the ravenges of time. What's amazing to me is it still retains all its crew and still has a ladder or two! There is a hand crank that raises up the ladder. But be careful...one short loss of attention of the crew and off you go during a corner!
